The European Space Agency wants to build a village on the Moon. The head of the international agency, Johann-Dietrich Woerner, said the village would "serve science, business, and tourism purposes as well as obtaining precious metals and other resources."

In a video interview posted on the agency's website, Woerner said a permanent base on the Moon is the next logical step in space exploration. He said the village could replace the International Space Station (ISS) in the future. The ISS has been constantly occupied since 2000. It was originally 26, but its operation has been extended through 2024.

The agency said it could take 20 years before the technology is ready to make the Moon village happen. Woerner said the agency could use the Moon's natural resources to build the village, instead of 27. Structures and parts of buildings could be 3D-printed using robots and other machines.

"We 28 at the beginning ... we can start with a small landing mission in order to save money, which many countries are already planning," he said.

Having a permanent human presence on the Moon could be risky, because of *cosmic radiation, small *meteorites, and extreme temperatures which can range from 253 degrees F (123°C) to minus 243°F (minus 153°C). But Woerner said these risks could be lowered 29 . "If we go into the shadow on the moon, we'd have places where we don't have the radiation ... at the south pole, which has permanent darkness, where we can find water," he said.

The Outer Space Treaty, which was signed in 1967, says that 30. The European Space Agency wants the Moon village to be an international effort that will combine the strengths of different nations which have a

space program.

When Natalie had discovered that Theodor (Ted) Geisel was the real name of Dr. Seuss, at first she didn't see Zoe's point. She thought about it on the bus ride home Thursday, and then off and on all night. By Friday morning Natalie had a pretty good idea why Zoe had made her learn about Ted Geisel.

But as the morning meeting ended and they headed toward the science rooms, Natalie pretended she didn't have a clue. That way, Zoe could explain everything. Natalie knew that was what Zoe always preferred.

[B] "So, do you get it?" asked Zoe.

Natalie stared at her. "Get what?"

"The idea — you know — Ted Geisel, Dr. Seuss?" prompted Zoe. "You can get your book published by using a different name. That way your mom won't know it's you! She reads, she likes, she publishes! Great idea, right? You get to pick a pseudonym, a fake name!"
